SOUNDS OF FILM By Adam Corrigan Holowitz Director of Audience Development

The underscore is one of the most powerful story telling tools available to filmmakers. Even before the talkies, silent films, had live musicians underscore the movie. This may be why, with the advent of sound, the underscore instantly became a ubiquitous element for this new kind of cinema.

There are certain themes (think *Stars Wars* or *Titanic*) which have become so recognized they lend themselves to parody nowadays. Yes filmmakers have a complicated push and pull relationship with underscoring. After all there is nothing more emotionally manipulative and also so unrealistic as a lavish film underscore.

The intelligent filmmaker uses music with great consideration. The absence of music, when intentional, in a film has become a powerful statement in and of itself. An important question filmmakers must ask is if music is "source sound" or "underscore". Source sound means there is music playing, but it is coming from a source in the scene, i.e. the characters also hear it; think a band or a record playing in a scene. Mel Brooks had great fun with this in *Blazing Saddles*, when the camera pulled back to reveal the Count Basie Orchestra playing in the desert.

But let's not give short shrift to the faithful underscore. Art does not need to be realistic. The classic songs and underscore of cinema have shaped the language of filmmaking that we love. That is what we are relishing in and celebrating at **Reel Music**.
